

The regular weekly meeting of the Huntingdon County Commissioners was held on the above date and time in the Commissioners meeting room with the following being present: Commissioners O’Korn, Fluke, and Thomas; Chief Clerk, Michelle Cerett; Planning Director, Mark Colussy; CYS Administrator, Joyce Zolten; Warden, Duane Black, Probation Director, Tim Guisler; Daily News Reporter Zach Myers and visitors Bruce Pergament, Herb Kann, Larry Grissinger, Anthony Bullett and Jim Cassatt.

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Commissioner O’Korn followed by prayer led by Commissioner O’Korn and the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag led by Commissioner Fluke.

It was moved by Commissioner Fluke, seconded by Commissioner Thomas and carried (O’Korn, yes; Fluke, yes; Thomas, yes) to approve of the minutes of the June 3<sup>rd</sup> public meeting.

It was moved by Commissioner Thomas, seconded by Commissioner Fluke and carried (Fluke, yes; Thomas, yes; O’Korn, yes) to approve the payment of bills.

There were no additions to the agenda.

Commissioner Thomas announced that the county will be receiving \$44,025.00 for Greenways Legacy fund and \$6,493.00 for the General Government Impact fee fund. He also announced that the County recently received a refund of approximately \$31,000.00 from the UC Trust fund, which is the first refund we have received since 2008. Lastly, Commissioner Thomas announced that Southern Alleghenies received a \$500,000.00 grant for the “Jobs First” program.

Mark Colussy, Planning Director reminded everyone of the Blueprint Communities meeting being held tomorrow evening at the Mount Union High School. The meeting will explain the Blueprint Communities program and introduce the Planning team. Anthony Bullett provided information on two important upcoming dates. The first one is Juneteenth, which will be held on June 21<sup>st</sup> at the Portstown Park. He encouraged all to attend. The second event will be held in various cities through the month of June. This event is related to the march towards equality for the gay, lesbian and transgender communities. Herb Kann provided information on the service of the Home Nursing Agency. He encouraged the Commissioners and the public to attend their meetings on the last Wednesday of each month to learn about the various programs. Mr. Kann stated that Home Nursing provides over \$200,000.00 in free care for Huntingdon County residents each year. Larry Grissinger, Springfield Township Supervisor addressed the Commissioners and asked for assistance with removing a Township Supervisor from office. Michelle informed him he would need to speak with his Solicitor. Commissioner O’Korn asked Mr. Grissinger to arrange a meeting through Michelle to discuss the situation.

First on the agenda today was Warden, Duane Black with a request to approve the annual contract with Service Access and Management. SAM, Inc. provides mental health services to County inmates on an as needed basis. After discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Thomas, seconded by Commissioner O’Korn and carried (Thomas, yes; O’Korn, yes; Fluke, yes) to approve the agreement with SAM, Inc. for a period of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015.

Joyce Zolten requested approval of a Purchase of service agreement with Kids Peace, Inc. After discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Thomas, seconded by Commissioner Fluke and carried (O’Korn, yes; Fluke, yes; Thomas, yes) to approve the Kids Peace contract as requested for a period of July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014.

Michelle provided the 2015 Holiday calendar for approval. It was moved by Commissioner Fluke, seconded by Commissioner Thomas and carried (Fluke, yes; Thomas, yes; O’Korn, yes) to approve the 2015 Holiday calendar as presented.

There were six county veteran burial allowances, installation of one government headstone and lettering of an existing headstone for approval today.

There being no further business, it was moved by Commissioner Fluke to adjourn the meeting at 10:12 a.m.
